A3.1	Question from Proponent Email: I am curious the reasoning for the "contaminated material" having to be removed and not being able to be placed back in trench. If the entire spray park site is deemed contaminated material is the extra cost to remove the small amount from the trenching, which the contamination may go deeper then the depth of the trench, and replace it with imported material worth it?
	Answer: It is a requirement by ATCO who is the lease owner of the site. This requirement will not be changed or adjusted, any contaminated soil excavated will need to be removed from site.
A3.2	Question from Proponent Email: There is a lot of risk not knowing how badly contaminated the material is to submit competitive pricing. The cost difference
	between going to the Drumheller landfill or if it is bad to Calgary or if its very bad as far as disposal sites in Saskatchewan are massive. Is there anyway we can for the purpose of pricing assume the material is OK to go to Drumheller landfill for all contractors but still include soil testing in pricing and if it can not go to Drumheller landfill based on testing results it will be re-evaluated as a change order to allow for the additional cost to other disposal site.
