#### Media Releases - Arrests in Drumheller Detachment area

On the evening of June 11, 2025, Drumheller RCMP initiated a traffic stop with a vehicle along Highway 56 after witnessing a traffic infraction. Police checks revealed that the driver had an outstanding warrant out of Edmonton, and therefore he was arrested.

While dealing with the passengers of the vehicle, Drumheller RCMP located suspected methamphetamine in the vehicle. All the occupants were arrested and a search of the vehicle incidental to arrest revealed the following:

- Over a pound of suspected methamphetamine
- 600 pills of various types
- A large quantity of cash
- Two firearms, one of which was loaded
- Suspected cannabis and cocaine
- Various weapons

49-year-old Sheldon Blyan, a resident of Edmonton, 34-year-old Mitchell Sydlowski, a resident of St. Albert, and 73-year-old Harvey Beeler, also of Edmonton, have been charged with numerous offences, some of which include:

- Possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking (x3)
- Possess restricted firearm & ammunition
- Unauthorized possession of firearm
- Possess dangerous weapon
- Breaches of their court orders

#### COMMUNICATIONS

- We appreciate everyone in getting their communications objectives to us and being able to support the awesome things you do. We are seeing a lot of positivity in terms of participation in different initiatives, but also helpful feedback from community members.

## **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

- Permitting continues to be busy. This includes 64
   Short-Term Rental licenses. We are well on track
   to exceed our Development and Safety permitting
   for 2024.
- Our 2025 Business Needs Survey is now complete. The partners and Ec. Dev. surveyed 100 companies with over 1,200 employees in total (About 25% of local workforce). Here are some stats below:
- Total annual sales across all sectors reached \$957 Million for 2024 (GDP estimate)
- Tourism impact is \$116 Million in 2024, and 1 in 4 jobs
- 81% of our businesses are small business (with 1-9 employees)
- Positive sentiment as 89% said they were thriving (36%) or sustaining (53%)
- 51% said they expected to hire at least one employee over the next 12 months
- 9% total employment growth forecasted between 2024 and 2030.
- It was a record month in land. The Town is considering multiple offers including residential, commercial and industrial.

#### Film

- Film continues to be strong. We have issued five permits and two drone permit year to date. Two additional projects are considering Drumheller.
- We also have a familiarization (FAM) tour schedule in July with seven Hollywood delegates. Studios include Amazon, Netflix, Paramount, Skydance, 20th Century Studios, Fremantle and Lionsgate Television.

### Family and Community Support Services (FCSS)

- FCSS is making a powerful impact with its latest round of grant funding, dedicating a total of \$100,000 to support local wellbeing and community building. Of this amount, \$70,000 has been awarded to seven community organizations, each chosen for their meaningful work in fostering connection, inclusion, and resilience across our town. These grants will support a range of programs that bring people together and strengthen our social fabric. A photo op is planned for early Fall with the Committee and Grant Recipients. The remaining \$30,000 has been allocated to the DrumLife Pass subsidy program, which provides low-income residents with financial assistance to access the Badlands Community Facility (BCF),
- Aquaplex and a program credit that opportunities for youth to attend programs such as Summer Camps and Swimming Lessons. This initiative ensures that more people can benefit from the physical and mental health advantages of staying active and engaged, regardless of their financial situation. Together, these investments reflect FCSS's ongoing commitment to making our community a healthier, more connected place for everyone.
